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2019 Ironman Awards



At our February meeting the 2019 Ironman awards were handed out to five individuals. Congratulations on a job well done:

Thanks to Bob Gerenser each awardee received a special Ironman badge with the symbol for iron (Fe). An IRONMAN is one who successfully completes all 12 President's Challenge projects for the year. Those who meet the challenge are awarded a coveted and distinctive IRONMAN badge. You needn't be a great turner, you just need to participate by making something for each President's Challenge theme.

February Program: Coring Systems



For our February program Mike Lanahan discussed how to core multiple bowls from a single blank. He discussed the basics of coring and presented two coring systems: the Oneway Easy-Core coring system and the McNaughton Center Saver coring system. A summary of each system was given with pros and cons and some cost information. Important considerations when coring include: securely mounting the bowl blank by making a large tenon (1/3 the diameter of bowl),

correctly sized and cleanly cut; selecting the slowest speed for maximum torque; placing remote STOP switch within easy reach if available; and sharpening the cutter for clean cut.

After his introduction Mike brought in a special guest (Mario of Mario Bros fame?) to help with a demo of


the Oneway coring system. The first step was to mark out multiple bowls to be cored. Three bowls were marked out as shown in the photos to the right. In the top photo the diameters of each bowl are marked with the width of each bowl being approximately 1/10 the diameter of the bowl. A second photo shows the depth of each bowl marked out.

These markings were then used to align the cutter. Mike had built a laser pointer jig to properly align the post that holds the cutter blade. One important note for any coring system is that the cutter tip needs to be aligned with the center axis of the bowl. The next step with this system is to set up the support blade below the cutter blade. Now you're ready to start coring.

Our special guest then took over the actual coring of two bowls. Easy does it - don't force the blade into the wood. If the blade start gets stuck due to a build up of chips, stop the lathe, pull the cutter out, and clear the chips. Before restarting the lathe, rotate the bowl in the reverse direction so that when the lathe is restarted there is enough momentum for the cutter to cut through the point where it bogged down. Methods for turning a new tenon in the cored bowl blanks were discussed.

Thank you Mike for an informative and engaging demo and to Dennis "Mario" Lillis for lending a helping hand.

Dixie Biggs Workshop Tools & Supplies

March 29, 2020

Tools & Supplies students should bring

Rotary power carver - My personal preference, for what I do, is a micro motor.

A couple of suggestions are the Mastercarver Micro-Pro Champion, found at <u>woodcarverssupply.com</u> and the Ram 207A Micro Motor or Ram Power 45 found at <u>www.mdiwoodcarvers.com</u>. No need to get the foot control. If you are planning to bring a flex-shaft, such as Foredom, **please check your maximum rpms**. Some of the older ones only go up to 18,000 rpms. This **will** cause you problems. The majority of my carving is done in the 25,000 - 35,000 rpm range. Also, if you bring a flex-shaft I would recommend bringing a portable tool stand. **Be sure to have a 3/32" collet for your carver.**

<u>Carving Burrs</u> - Please bring the following burrs plus your favorites. They can be found at:

<u>Turned Disc</u> - You should bring a turned dome shaped disc about 6"-7" in diameter. This must be dry wood not green. Cherry is the preferred choice. Avoid woods with open grain or ones that may cause allergic reactions. You mainly want a nice tight grain wood with no figure. This will enable you to practice working on a curved surface, before attempting one of your turnings.





1 ¼" thick by about 7" diameter dome shape disc works well. I make mine out of kiln dry board stock.

Woodburner - If you have one

<u>Also Needed</u>: dust mask, ear plugs, old tooth brush and pencil & paper. If you need magnifiers for detail work, don't forget to bring those. A task light is very helpful, also, a cushion to sit on. It's a long day of sitting!




