September Program:

Dennis Lillis gave a comprehensive presentation on several methods of inlaying different materials in turned objects. The materials discussed ranged from crushed stone, wooden shapes of various forms, to powdered metal. His presentation began



by showing examples of different turned pieces with inlayed mate-



thin wooden shapes as inlays (see the turtle below). A pattern is routed in the turned piece, usually to hide or accentuate a defect, or stabilize a crack.



rials. To the left is a hollow form with turquoise inlayed in the voids. The picture below shows an inlay of Lapis and "cold gold" (fine metal powder) in a small crack in a madrone burl bowl. Another type of inlay used



Dennis' detailed descriptions of the techniques involved were extremely helpful in providing us with the tools to try inlaying.

Monthly Demonstration - Inlay work by Dennis Lillis

Using sanding dust to fill small voids

For small voids one can use dust from sanding to fill a void. Fill the void with the dust and then use thin CA glue to set dust in place.



Filling large voids with wood shavings

Dennis covered how to fill large voids on a hollow form (bottom photo) turned from pepperwood burl (photo below left). Not wanting to have to fill the entire depth of the cracks with crushed stone he first packed the voids with wood shavings (photo below right) leaving a small area near the external surface of the hollow form and secured the shavings with thin CA glue. Crushed stone was then placed in the remaining void and soaked with CA glue. Once dry the inside of the hollow form was hollowed out. This technique reduces the amount of crushed stone used and allows the inside to be hollowed without the hollowing tool catching on the stone inlay.



Crushing Stone

Crushing stone is easily accomplished using a piece of pipe, a solid metal rod, and a flat metal plate.

After crushing the stone it is separated into different size grains using different sized sieves.



Inlaying wooden inserts

The final topic of the night was how to inlay wooden inserts in a turned piece. Dennis showed how a router is used to carve a recess in a bowl. The process begins by attaching a template to the bowl and using a glue gun to secure the template in place. Painters tape applied to the template and bowl allows easy removal of the template. The pattern may need some cleanup using a hand chisel. The wooden insert is then glued in place and the edges beveled to prevent your gouge from tearing the wooden insert out during final turning of the bowl.



David will provide an all-day demonstration at the Bridges Church in Los Altos. The doors will open at 9:00 am. The general public is invited to attend.

David is unequalled in the turning world, but most turners already know this. David is most famous for his thin walled hollow forms turned thru a small opening, usually from spalted woods or with natural voids. His development of tools and techniques for thin wall "blind" hollowing revolutionized woodturning, and contributed greatly to the explosive growth of woodturning in the 1980's and 1990's. He is a founding member of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) and served as its first President, nurturing and guiding it thru its early years. Without David's early commitment and unending support it is doubtful that the AAW would be the organization it is today! A heartfelt thanks from all of us, David!!

David's first book "Ellsworth on Woodturning" continues to receive rave reviews from the woodturning community.










